




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## New Era - The Student Opportunity Act (SOA)

- Student Opportunity Act signed in 2019. Most significant K-12 funding reform since 1993. FY 2022 was 1<sup>st</sup> year SOA took effect, FY 2024 is the 3<sup>rd</sup>
- Student Opportunity Act reforms initially projected to add \$2.2B to K-12 funding over 6 years. Includes mostly Chapter 70 aid, remainder for special education circuit breaker grants, small innovation grant. SOA on track in FY 2024
- Plan to add funds for circuit breaker through FY 2024 is basically complete with current budget, full charter reimbursement complete last year


## How the SOA Increases K-12 Aid

- Increased aid from reforms in the SOA, targets in 4 main areas over 6 years: low-income, health care, special education rates and enrollment assumptions, ELL increases.
- Low-income rate SOA provides added funding based on share of lowincome kids - up to \$9,400 per student when implemented (FY 2024 dollars) nearly double the rate before SOA
- Enrollment 185 FPL low-income threshold, including matching against public programs and supplemental data collection. Count is critical to higher rates in SOA. COVID era decline in enrollment also a key issue


#### K-12 Highlights - FY 2024 Budget

- FY 2024 budget half of SOA complete, another \$640M increase to Chapter 70 and other SOA items, on pace for implementation by FY 2027. Roughly \$1.3B in total aid increase. Focused in low-income communities, allowing for more transformative investments
- COVID era impacts enrollment remains stable from last year, down from before the pandemic. Inflation in the formula at maximum of 4.5% for a second straight year in FY 2024. Not accounting for full cost growth in this period. Free school meals maintained through new funding in the state budget

Chapter 70 Foundation All Special Education Assumed Enrollment, FY 2021 (baseline) – FY 2024 (SOA year 3 of 6)



Chapter 70 Foundation Budget Rates, FY 2021 (baseline) – FY 2024 (SOA year 3 of 6)



Inflation adjusted circuit breaker funding, FY 2012 – FY 2024 Current, millions



FY 2022 expenses, reimbursements, local share, millions




## Latest on Special Education Costs

- October memo from Operational Services Division, suggests a moderate inflation increase of 4.7% in the cost of private special education services in FY 2024
- Dramatic decrease from the 14% cost increase in FY 2024 it appears OSD is not broadly concerned with retention & attrition problems in the field, that necessitated the unprecedented increases. Generally, in line with the rest of the Chapter 70 system
- Late-breaking story to follow supplemental budget moving now that would add \$75M account to help address the FY 2024 spike in special education costs, this appears likely to pass soon
