Fourth year the Student Opportunity Act

ending ESSER:

- · ESSER I and II have been obligated and expended
- · \$1.2M of ESSER II in late liquidation being spent out
- ESSER III: 52% of all funds claimed (\$860M)
- The state expects that a number of districts will want late liquidation authority for ESSER III.
- Districts have to have obligated funds by end of September, but would have 18 months to spend out with late liquidation.



Low income count:

- Based on 185% of the federal poverty level (due to the Student Opportunity Act)
- · Students are eligible three ways:
 - Enrollment in state public assistance programs: SNAP; TAFDC; MassHealth; or
 - · Reported by a district as homeless; or
 - · Verified via supplemental process through the district





Per DESE Ch. 70 state aid and spending requirement FY24 & FY25 Note chart estimates drop in foundation budget given current enrollment but higher group dollar amount.

This is not a one year issue as low income count:

- · Moves on a four period match system
- Thus for FY26, students counted as low income for:
 - October of 2024; the end of this school year (June 2024); March 2024; October 2023
- And for FY27, students counted as low income for:
 - October of 2025; the end of next school year (June 2025); March 2025; October 2024





Where does this put us?


- The drop in the number of counted low income students both drops the count (across the state) and drops the dollar amount when it overlaps with a group change.
- Inflation is the piece that is intended to take into account the increase in costs year over year. It is fair to say that this year, it does not.
- Together, these work against the reforms of the Student Opportunity Act, leading to fewer districts seeing significant increases in state aid, fewer districts leaving hold harmless, and many districts even sliding back into hold harmless this coming year.
